Following is a copy of a petition which is being circulated in the Rural Municipality of Lipton. When sufficient signatures have been obtained, the petition will be forwarded to the Provincial Minister of Agriculture:

The petition of the undersigned, ratepayers of the Rural Municipality of Lipton, No. 217, humbly sheweth

That the Council of this Municipality, through its majority, has petitioned the Minister of Agriculture to have this Municipality constituted a Pure Bred District and the licensing of stallions traveling for profit or gain.

Your petitioners are alive to the necessity of adopting this extreme measure in Saskatchewan, or any portion thereof, at the earliest possible moment, in the best interests of the horse industry of the province as a whole.

We, however, feel owing to the scarcity of Pure Bred Sires, to force such an active measure at the present time would have an injurious effect on the majority of the people of this Municipality.

A glance at Bulletin No. 39, issued by the Department of Agriculture in 1914, will show only five Pure Bred horses were registered last year. Since then one has died and one removed, proving the hardship that such a measure would entail, leaving the majority at the mercy of the few stallion owners.

We would, however, welcome any measure that would place Pure Bred Sires at the disposal of our people that would discourage the use of inferior animals without coercion.

We therefore humbly ask that the petition of the Council of the Rural Municipality of Lipton, No. 217, be not granted.

And your petitioners will ever pray.

### SPECIAL MISSION SERVICES

Those who were privileged to hear Rev. Father Donnelly at the Roman Catholic Church during the past week are unanimous in declaring him to be the best speaker Cupar people have heard for many a day. Commencing last Thursday evening, services were continued until Wednesday morning, and without exception, the church has been crowded at every service. Rev. Father Joerison, the parish priest, assisted Father Donnelly during the mission.

To Protestants an invitation was extended to attend, that they might gain an insight into the doctrines and teachings of the Catholic Church, and large numbers took advantage of the invitation. To Catholics it was an opportunity to renew their allegiance to the church and infuse new life and enthusiasm into its activities. To both it afforded an unequalled opportunity of hearing a learned, vigorous and earnest speaker expound the cause of religion and plead for a more Christian brotherhood and a greater interest in the workings and teachings of the church. Undoubtedly Father Donnelly accomplished a great amount of good work during his stay here and there is no doubt that his eloquent and inspiring sermons have been taken to heart by a great many. It is the hope of all who heard him that they may again have the pleasure of hearing him, and should he have the opportunity he will pay another visit to Cupar.

On Wednesday evening a St. Patrick's banquet was held in the school building, at which Father Donnelly was the guest of honor. About 65 were present and after disposing of the sumptuous repast provided by the Ladies Aid, a social evening was enjoyed. Speeches were made and numerous songs, musical selections, etc., rendered. Father Donnelly proved a most entertaining guest and great praise is due him for his efforts in entertaining the banqueters. After spending a very pleasant evening the assembly dispersed at about twelve o'clock.

It is a source of gratification to members of the Catholic Church that their first mission should have been such a success and its good results will, no doubt, be plainly apparent amongst the Catholics of this district.

### THE NEW TARIFF

The Beatous Traction Co., local Ford dealers, are in receipt of a communication which reads as follows:

The new war tax of 7 1/2% on imports from the United States went into effect February 12th, 1915.

This adds an additional ad valorem duty of 7 1/2% to the former duty on all motor cars, motor car parts and accessories, etc., making a total duty of 14 1/2% on all cars imported into Canada from the United States.

Although the Ford is built in Canada, by Canadian labor, by Canadian capital, and for the most part of Canadian materials, there are a few materials such as special steel, etc., not obtainable in Canada, which we are forced to purchase in the States.

On these materials we, of course, must pay the increased duty of 7 1/2%. We intend to absorb this 7 1/2% increase in our manufacturing costs.

There will be no advance in the retail prices of Ford cars because of the new war tax.

### FARM HELP

It would seem that help for farming operations in Saskatchewan will be difficult to obtain this year. There is practically no immigration and many men have joined the troops, whilst on the other hand farmers will likely be working a larger area of land than usual. Capable farm help, however, can be secured at present in limited quantities but next spring will undoubtedly see a shortage, with higher wages as a consequence.

The Bureau of Labor, Department of Agriculture at Regina, is prepared to render assistance to farmers desiring help, but applications should be made at once. Amongst the available supply of experienced farm laborers are a number of people of foreign birth and farmers should state whether they will take a foreigner; also state wages and length of service. It will be necessary to offer fairly good wages, and men should be taken as early as possible, or say March 1st, March 15th or April 1st.

## A FEW MARKET REPORTS

**Linseed Oil**--While the wholesale price of raw oil has advanced 30 p.c., we bought heavily before the rise and are selling at last year's prices. This is the only screw press oil sold in Cupar and the best oil on the market for horses.

**Paints**--There has been no advance to date in ready mixed paints over last summer's prices. Our spring stock is just in. We have the largest stock of paint in town; our spring shipment weighing 3800 lbs. We also believe it is the best stock--Sherwin-Williams.

**Glass**--The advance in glass since the war started has been one of the heaviest. Here again we bought early and are giving our customers the benefit.

**Formalin**--No advance. Our stock is full strength and was not carried over.

**Wire Fencing**--The prices on woven fence have not changed but we cannot guarantee prices except for immediate shipment. Our policy of booking orders for barbed wire during the past month has proved wise. We have sold a car of wire for delivery just after seeding. While those who did not get in on the first 100 spools have to pay an advance of 15c. over last year's prices, they have protected themselves against the 2nd and 3rd advance. Wire has advanced 30c. per spool this spring.

**Ranges**--We do not anticipate an advance in the price of ranges. However, we have booked our fall heaters.

**Ammunition**--Loaded shells (Dominion) have advanced \$3.00 per M. We are not advancing prices.

**In general**--Our prices on your spring requirements show essentially no advance.
