Mrs. Ford was born in England and for eight years prior to her illness was housekeeper for A. Briemeier, who resides in the Sanctuary district.

The funeral service will be held in St. Andrew's Anglican Church, Rosetown, on Friday, December 8 at 2 p. m. T. Clements, of Rosetown, is in charge of arrangements.

She is survived by a 13-year-old daughter, Dolores; her parents, who live on the west coast; a sister, Mrs. A. Murray, at Gunworth; another sister, Florence, in Saskatoon; three sisters who reside in other parts of Canada and two brothers overseas.

MRS. GEORGE WALEN

Friends of Mrs. George Waleen learned with deep regret of her death, which took place in a Saskatoon hospital on November 28. Mrs. Waleen had resided in Saskatoon for the past three years, going there with her husband and family after leaving their farm near Plato. Five years ago she brought the family to spend the winter in Elrose, where the children attended high school. She was the first secretary of the local Red Cross branch and after its re-organization that fall, and friends knew her to be a capable woman in community affairs as well as in her home. Her death, at the age of 45, will be a great loss to her husband and children.

CLAUDE C. DARROW

Relatives, friends and the whole community mourn the passing, on the morning of November 23, 1944, of their friend, Claude C. Darrow, who was one of the early pioneers of the White Bear and Tuberosa districts.

The late Mr. Darrow was born at Browning, Missouri, on May 29, 1878, and on March 29, 1905, he was married to Miss Lulu Moore. The following year Mr. and Mrs. Darrow came to Canada and, along with his parents, settled on homesteads in the White Bear community. After 1907 their home was a center of pioneer hospitality and a stopping place for all who travelled to distant market towns. It was later that the Darrows made their home in Tuberosa, where for 12 years, Mr. Darrow assisted C. W. Akister in one of the earliest stores in that community, and made a host of friends.

Mr. Darrow was an active member, and for some years also was the secretary of the local United Church. He assisted with the development of the Tuberosa Chapter of the Masonic and Eastern Star Fraternities, having been made a member of the Masonic Order in the year 1926. Since that time he held all the offices up to and including Worshipful Master in that lodge.

He is survived by his widow, who lives in Tuberosa; his daughter, Mrs. Fred Rowley, of Tyner; his mother, Mrs. Liew Darrow, who is 90 years of age; his brother, Lark Darrow; and a sister, Mrs. Wayne McKay, all of whom reside in White Bear.

At the closing of the Eastern Star flower ceremony, the hymn "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung.

Following interment in the White Bear cemetery the last rites of the Masonic Order were bestowed upon their brother Mason. The palbearers were: J. Pittman, Orley Johnson, Ed. Upson, Kenneth Lytle, Chester Clark and William Lindsey.

Obituary

LOUIS HINTZE

Louis Hintze, an old-timer of the Hughton district, passed away suddenly on Tuesday evening, December 5, 1944, at the age of 63 years. He had complained during the day of having a slight pain in his chest, but did not think it was anything serious. However, Tuesday night his wife persuaded him to come and see Dr. Ranson and when about half way between Hughton and Elrose he passed away in the car.

Mr. Hintze was born in Gray County and came west to Manitoba in 1900 and in 1907 he came to the Hughton district where he took up a homestead.
