Flying Officer Bouschard D.F.C. Made Forty Operational Flights—NORTH BATTLEFORD NEWS

Flying Officer A.D. Bouschard Lake St. Cyr district forty miles out of Meadow Lake, was in the city for a day or two this week. He left for his home in the North yesterday going by bus to Meadow Lake and motoring the balance of the way.

F.O. Bouschard has been in Britain on air duty for three years. This time was spent flying over the Mediterranean, England and Germany. He belonged to the famous "Pathfinder" squadron, and before returning home, he made forty operational flights over France, Germany and other target territory. Flying Officer Bouschard is the winner of the Distinguished Flying Cross and also wears the Pathfinders badge.

He will remain at home for a month and then report for duty in Canada.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL BONSPIEL COMPLETED Hildred Rink Wins Grand Challenge. Scotty Crozier's ladies rink wins second event.

A curling trophy designed and donated to the Dorintosh curling club by Clarence Willows is now held by Leonard McKay's rink after several vain attempts have been made by different rinks to wrest it from him. Playing for it is suspended for the present owing to the Bonspiel being in full swing.

A few of the highlights being listed up until late Sat. night. Only one rink remains undefeated, this rink being skipped by W.C. Hildred. The other rink out in front went down to defeat in the late Saturday night draw. This rink was skipped by F.L. McRae and was defeated by a rink of ladies skipped by Scotty Crozier, and, boy, did they lay it on!; the final score being Crozier 23 - McRae 3.

## PLAN TO MAINTAIN HOG PRODUCTION During 1944 and 1945

Every good quality hog that can be produced during the next two years will be needed.

The current bacon contract is for two years. It guarantees bacon prices and the delivery of 900 million pounds of bacon over the contract period. To help Britain maintain her present weekly ration of 4 oz. for each person Canada will try to deliver 600 million pounds of bacon this year.

### IMPROVE QUALITY

Quality premiums of \$3.00 for each Grade A carcass and \$2.00 for each Grade B1 carcass have been authorized. They increase the net profit in hog production and emphasize the urgency of improving quality to protect the after-the-war position on the British market.

#### Hog Production is Profitable

After allowing reasonable feed allowances and liberal overhead charges to cover all possible costs the following net returns can now be expected from feed grains fed to hogs:
