World of Wheat

BY H. C. L. STRANGE

I have just returned from observing the farm home weaving classes and circles now being sponsored by the Searle Grain Company. I found that our prairie women of all races are most keenly interested in learning the art of weaving. Here and there I heard of a few women who already are spinning and weaving. I visited several of these — one weaver was 85 years of age — in company with one of the world's most experienced teachers of weaving. This teacher was greatly impressed with the high quality of the spinning and weaving work being done by our prairie women. She suggested it would be a nice thing if some one could compile the names and addresses of all the farm women who are now spinning and weaving so that they might be encouraged in the good work they are doing with this useful and beautiful art.

If my friends, therefore, who read this column know of any such farm women and girls in their vicinity who are spinning

or who are weaving on their own looms, I should be grateful if they would let me have the names and addresses of such persons, and I will see that they are given some encouragement in their worthwhile work.

Visual Aids Service Improved

Plans to provide schools in Saskatchewan with improved service in visual aids and in educational broadcasts are being made, and teachers are invited to write to the auto-visual instruction branch, Department of Education, for the visual aids catalogue and radio teaching guide.

M. P. Toombs, supervisor, audio-visual instruction, has announced that a new catalogue of visual aids, which will set forth in greater detail the materials available, is being prepared. Information regarding the radio programs for the 1942 fall term will not be available until September.

In the meantime, Mr. Toombs said, there is on hand a limited number of radio manuals, describing the programs for the present term and giving general suggestions regarding the use of radio in the classroom.

Looking Ahead

Canadian people may be divided roughly into two groups at the present time. One group is spending money as fast as it comes in. The others are piling up War Saving Certificates and Bonds as high as possible through rigid suppression of the temptation to spend as others are doing.

The spending group is finding it increasingly difficult to buy expensive articles, as war production increasingly curtails the manufacture of many peacetime commodities. But they manage to spend most of their current income by the purchase of many articles and services to be secured at low cost. Thus, Canadian amusement centres are finding it hard to accommodate the crowds. Retail stores are besieged daily by thousands of men and women who make a raid on merchandise costing from 25c up to \$15 and \$20.

There is one certain prediction which may be made now. When peace comes, the men and women who will be able to buy new furniture, new cars, washing machines, radios and the like, or who will be taking holiday trips to famous resorts, will not be those who are now spending their quarters and dollar bills with reckless abandon. The spending spree after the war will be conducted largely by the people who are now investing heavily in Government war securities.

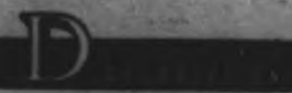

Wheat Stem Sawfly Again
 Last January we drew the attention of our readers to a Dominion Government circular entitled "Control of Wheat Stem Sawfly." The Division of Entomology, Ottawa, has recently prepared a coloured map which shows the extent of sawfly infestation in the prairie provinces. The colours on the map are very bright; but the prospect rather gloomy. Sawfly is present over an area bounded by a line extending from the international boundary approximately through Winnipeg, Kamsack, Prince Albert, Edmonton, Calgary and Cardston. Obviously this leaves a comparatively small proportion of our wheat growing area entirely free from infestation.

On the back of the sawfly map will be found a summary of the problem and brief descriptions of control measures. The following statement is made:

"Plans must be made immediately to start sawfly control on infested farms. No farmer who suffered loss in 1941 should continue farming without recognizing the problem and taking steps to reduce the loss caused by this insect."

In order to consult the sawfly map and information provided therewith, farmers have only to call on grain buyers in any of the line elevators associated with the work of the Agricultural Department of the North-West Line Elevators Association. Grain buyers also have copies of the excellent bulletin, written by Dr. C. W. Farstad, to which reference was made in our January article.
