ATTENTION FARMERS!

TEST YOUR SEED GRAIN

Frost or dampness may have damaged the germination. To make a test, place 100 grains in moist soil. Keep the soil moist. Keep it warm, not hot, not cold.

Avoid extremes of temperature such as might be caused by placing the soil near a hot stove or a cold window. Good seed should germinate 80 percent, or more, in ten days. If it is proposed to use tough or damp grain for seed, especially if it was harvested late particular care should be taken to see that germination is good. Before testing Flax it should be treated with a mercury dust.

No Stock Arrived... "Climax" is Late

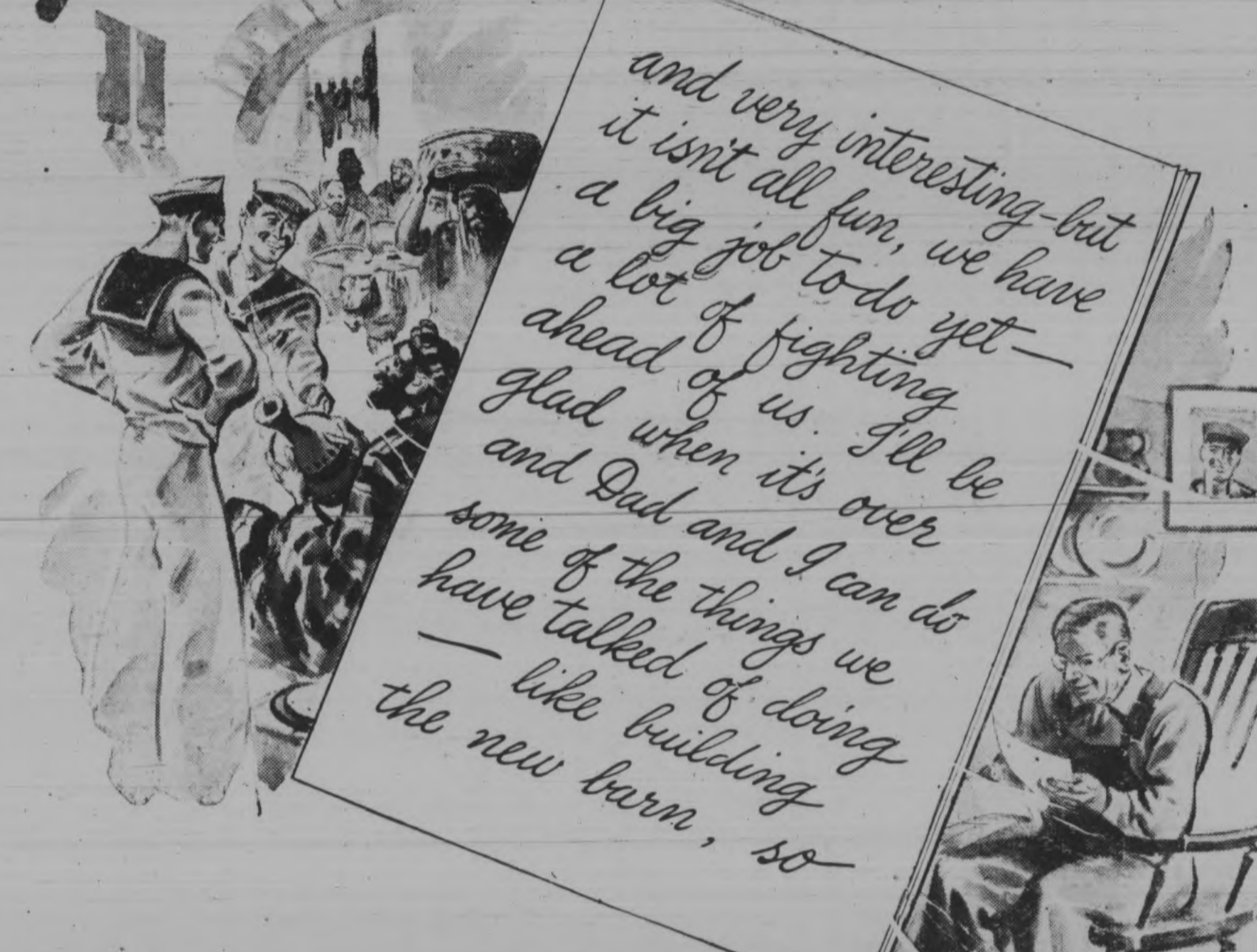
